Lum Library offers full text searching

The Appraisal Institute, based in Chicago, IL, has used <u>Liberty</u> since 2008, moving from their previous system, SirsiDynix Horizon.

At the time, the Appraisal Institute's vendor was discontinuing the incumbent Horizon system, presenting Eric Goodman, the Senior Manager of the Lum Library, with a significant problem.

Case Study

The Lum Library had just embarked on a huge project with their legacy system and had no way of realizing their project goals.

"The actual demonstration was without any doubt superior to the others. Liberty had the easiest user interface with the OPAC and data entry was very smooth. That was a highlight."

A replacement project was started. It was important to meet the current needs for information management and provide a more elegant solution than already existed, but also to partner with a provider who could move with the Institute's future direction and plans.

One of the main things Eric was looking for in a new ILS was to provide as much information online as possible to enable members to search remotely.

What Eric noticed in the demonstration stages of his evaluation of replacement systems, was that <u>Liberty's</u> OPAC would give the members a more intuitive means of searching and the screen could be tailored to fit the Institute's particular needs.

Eric identified the requirement to assign rights and access privileges in quite specific ways so that particular groups of users could access only the records that they had rights to see.

There were five distinct groups of users; from the public through to Board Members. <u>Liberty's</u> Security and Rights Management functionality, along with a Softlink developed script used to set values programmatically in the users' records, satisfied this exact requirement.

Prior to <u>Liberty</u>, the <u>Appraisal Institute</u> had been using two separate databases in order to offer their members full access to materials and to full text searching of all internally published articles.

What <u>Softlink</u> was able to do with the Institute's database was merge documents from two data sources and link them directly to the <u>Liberty</u> catalog records, resulting in full text indexing of all linked articles and an integrated environment for members.

Opting for the SaaS implementation of <u>Liberty</u> meant the Institute was able to retire its 8-year-old server, replacing it with an external platform.

This provides sufficient disk storage to accommodate the library's electronic holdings, for the present and into the future, with no more complicated "workarounds" to manage the indexing and linking of PDFs. In Liberty, this is native functionality.
